New coding guidelines conflict with OASIS guidance on pressure ulcers. For example, a pressure ulcer treated with a muscle graft is no longer a pressure ulcer according to OASIS guidance, but is still coded as a pressure ulcer. Identify the stage codes for pressure ulcers. These changes are a foresight to OASIS C changes on pressure ulcers. Those vile V codes are wreaking havoc on the risk adjustment of your outcomes and will do the same to your payment under the proposed PPS. CMS even mentions in the proposal that the over utilization of V codes restricted their ability to determine which diagnoses should be case mix diagnoses! The voluminous V code problem stems from two issues: 1) we like them (they are required sometimes), and 2) we are vexed by their use. The overuse and misuse of the vexing V codes are a big issue on the coding certification exam.
